communities are needed also. If there is no parking space for them, then there is no reason to utilize what the town offers. There are other areas for shopping that offer parking whether up the peninsula or in the Five Towns.


The community board decided to accept the proposed plan with one caveat: that the problem of parking in the downtown area be addressed.

Email - CCHIN@DOT.NYC.GOV. Displays of downtown Far Rockaway were everywhere along with boards for listing your ideas and colorcoded dots to put on the maps to show problem areas. What did we learn? The sidewalks on some of Mott Avenue are too narrow so they will be made wider. Parking will be reduced so bike lanes can be fitted onto the streets. No one seemed to know that there are many medical and therapy offices on Beach 20th Street or that there is a hospital as they want to take away parking from one side of that street and add, you guessed it, bike lanes. No one in the DOT realized how essential parking is in that area or that the streets around are completely parked on all day long. In fact, regarding parking, no space was being added.

No one in DOT understood that the crowding of Beach Channel Drive contributed to the crowding of roads because the lanes had been reduced. No one in the DOT knew that there was no public transportation in Bayswater so that we needed cars to make use of downtown Far Rockaway. This is much like the incompetency in developing the Select Bus Service (SBS) for the peninsula and the narrowing of Cross Bay Boulevard and Woodhaven Boulevard, and the removal of some bus stops on the peninsula.

The money is there for the improvement of Downtown Far Rockaway.

The second meeting that BCA board members attended was the Community Board #14 monthly meeting on November 10th.

The largest rebuttal of the night from both the community board and the residents/observers came when NYC Planner Brendan Pillar spoke about the Mandatory Inclusionary Housing (MIH) that Mayor de Blasio is talking up in his plan to create 200,000 apartments for low-to middle-income New Yorkers. Everyone declared that the Rockaways and Far Rockaway especially are inundated with low-income housing and nursing homes. They declared, "We have done our share. Give us something that will uplift the area, that will bring in money to spend which would bring in a better selection of businesses for the community to shop in.

Even as this is being fought, the building on Beach 45th Street and Rockaway Beach Boulevard of a dwelling consisting of 101 units of mixed housing which includes studio, one-, two-, and threebedroom apartments, and affordable to very low and low-income households is going up. The building is being called Beach Green North. The Queens and Bronx borough boards - made up of community boards - have voted down the proposals. Mayor de Blasio said in a November 15, 2015 article that he is resolute and the community boards aren't the final decision makers; it is the mayor and City Council who will decide.

## FAR ROCKAWAY AND OUR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

We are not sure that we are happy with plans that seem to be coming out of NYC's Department of Transportation (DOT) which will affect our bus and car traveling.

Had you been at our open meeting with Philip McManus (PhilAMcManus@gmail.com), you would have heard that DOT wants to make some changes to the Rockaway bus routes which may include removing some bus stops via Select Bus Service (SBS) also known as Bus Rapid Transit. DOT also wants to change Cross Bay Boulevard and Woodhaven Boulevard by having a dedicated lane for Select Bus Service, effectively cutting down lanes for cars and trucks along with eliminating left turn lanes making traffic very slow and difficult to negotiate. Emergency vehicles will use only the dedicated bus lanes, but what will happen if there are buses and there's no room to maneuver by other traffic on the roads. How will SBS buses pass local buses on the peninsula with traffic lanes already reduced? SBS also plans to space the bus stops further apart so reducing them while causing more walking. It behooves us to get all the facts and write or email our councilmen, DOT, Queensborough President M. Katz, etc. to voice our opinions and needs.

### MOSQUITOES AND YOU

The Health Department conducted its first aerial larvicide application operation to marsh and other non-residential areas of Staten Island, Brooklyn, Queens, and the Bronx from May 12th to May 14th.

The Health Department monitors mosquitoes that carry the West Nile virus and could carry the Zika virus, and applies pesticides to their breeding grounds when appropriate throughout the summer. During warm weather, mosquitoes can breed in any still water standing for more than four days. The most effective way to control mosquitoes is to eliminate any standing water, mosquito-proof homes, and take precautions when spending time outdoors.

The Health Department uses naturally occuring and environmentally friendly larvicides to kill infant mosquito eggs before they grow into adults. Altosid XROG® or VectoBac® GS all containing naturally occuring bacteria being used are products approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and will be used on mosquito-breeding sites throughout the mosquito season.

Reducing Exposure to Mosquitoes

Use an approved insect repellent containing picaridin, DEET, oil of lemon eucalyptus (not for children under 3), or products that contain the active ingredient IR3535.

Make sure windows have screens and repair or replace screens that have tears or holes. Eliminate any standing water from your property and dispose of containers that can collect water. Standing water is a violation of the New York City Health Code.

Make sure roof gutters are clean and draining properly.

Clean and chlorinate swimming pools, outdoor saunas and hot tubs. Keep them empty or covered if not in use; drain water that collects in pool covers. Report standing water by calling 311 or visiting nyc.gov/health/wnv.

### COMMUNITY BOARD #14 AND DOWNTOWN FAR ROCKAWAY

At the CB #14 meeting on May 10th a DOT representative said that the downtown area is of extreme importance to city planners as a transportation hub in case of another major storm. With reference to the lack of planned parking and that there is not enough parking now CB14 voted to support the proposal with the caveat that conditional on-street parking be located, including but not limited to muni-meters, along 19th Street and from Smith Place to Foam Place.

#### FLOODING AND THE ROCKAWAYS AND JAMAICA BAY

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will present a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the Rockaway/Jamaica Bay Reformulation Study for viewing in June, 2016 with a 30-day public comment period to follow.

At a Jamaica Bay Task Force meeting on May 5, Mr. Dan Falt, the USACEA project manager for this study gave an update on the plans for residents on the bay side of the Rockaways. Following is the WAVE article written by Daniel Offner concerning this study:

In March, Falt told The Wave that the Army Corps was considering a combination of its "Perimeter Plan" and "Inlet Barrier" proposals.

According to Falt, the first, known as the "Perimeter Plan," would cost approximately \$5.2 billion to construct a flood gate that would stretch 44 miles from either, Kingsborough Comunity College to Breezy Point, or somewhere closer to the Marine Parkway Bridge. The second, which is refereed to as the "Inlet Barrier" plan, would cost \$2.8 billion and calls for smaller flood gates to be placed from Coney Island Creek to East Rockaway inslet.

"Even though we're spending this money, we're getting benefit/cost ratios of \$2.6 [billion]," Falt said. "So, we're getting very positive benefit calculations." Hurricane barriers were originally authorized for construction in 1964, when the Army Corps realized they needed to do additional testing to truly weigh the cost and benefit of the gate.

"So when we get this feasibility report out and it's a go, we're still going to need to go to plans and spec and do a ton more research to make sure we don't do any irreparable harm to the bay," Falt said.

Right now, Falt said the Army Corps is proposing a swing gate for the navigation channel and lift gates for the rest of the length of the barrier.
